Principal Comments

Dear Parents,

With the nation currently on red alert for the Corona Virus, children and families are rightly concerned and cautious. We are encouraging a calm and realistic approach to this to prevent panic and undue anxiety in the children. I would like to reassure you all that we will always take the best possible precaution to mitigate risks as far as we can and we are following the Public Health guidelines in promoting good hand and health hygiene. Teachers have been talking to your children about this in the class too: washing hands correctly, sneezing into tissues or the crook of the elbow if tissues are not available, not touching your face and we continue to have anti-bacterial hand gel in all of the classrooms. Catch it. Kill it. Bin it. We have also put anti-bacterial hand gel at the front office and we will expect all visitors to use it before entering and leaving the school. Please do actively seek to follow these guidelines yourself and should you be concerned that you or your child may have been in contact with someone from the high risk areas, please phone 111 or consult a GP. If you do make the decision to self-isolate then please inform the school office immediately so that we can make informed decisions to take appropriate action to protect all of our children and staff and support you in any way we can. You will most probably be aware that the Government is considering the closure of schools should the next phase of their control plans be put into action. I would encourage you to start preparing for this as I am fearful that I will not get much notice for this. As soon as I hear I will inform you. Please be assured that the teachers will ensure there are learning activities for your children to access and this will most likely be via the school's ICT platform, Purple Mash. If internet access could be a problem for you, please do let the school office know asap so that we can prepare adequately for your child.


Maths Day Challenge
