# What will we do if we have a lockdown again?

At present, we seem to be fortunate locally but we are not complacent. We are preparing for what may seem inevitable and will stick with what worked from the previous lockdown with a few additions. Our website is now set up with an online learning page for all year groups. It will offer:

- Quick and simple access to video links for those with internet access at home.
- A page dedicated to their curriculum with a combination of live lessons, teacher video instruction and links to online platforms for pupils to access tasks and upload work.
- Live lessons will be delivered at key points in the learning journey and may be whole class or selected groups of pupils, dependent on assessment.
- Work will be set in line with good teaching as defined by the school.
- For pupils without access to the internet, the school will seek to remove this barrier. Hard copies of learning and visual check-ins with the pastoral team to offer support and guidance.
- Live email links will be on the website for contact.

We will also continue with regular check-ins.

Please can you let the school know asap should you not have internet access or a device that enables your child to work online.

# **Harvest Celebrations**

We would normally be holding a Harvest celebration and getting together as a community to celebrate generosity and thankfulness. This is always a well attended event, which we will all miss this year. However, we are still celebrating Harvest and will be sharing our celebrations in the new term. The children will be presenting their reflections on Harvest to you in a video in the first week back. We will also be collecting food donations for the Rainbow Centre.

Non perishable food items must be brought in a plastic bag and will be kept in a safe place for 48 hours away from all staff and children. There will be a small box outside your child's class for them to leave the donations in. Please ensure any donations are in date and sealed.

The Rainbow Centre are also taking cash donations, which they will spend on food to support the homeless. If you would like to make a donation, you can do this through our Parent Pay app.

# **Attendance and Late Arrivals**

We have hit our target for attendance this term, despite the challenges. 95.7% is fantastic! With the arrival of children now smooth running and routines well established, we are finding the management of late arriving children a challenge, as there is not the space or capacity in the front office to keep children socially distant in separate bubbles and supervised.

From term 2, the entrances to year groups will be open from 08:30 and closed by 08:50. Any children arriving after 08:50 will need to line up, supervised by parents and socially distant in the marked areas inside the main gate. The Pastoral Team will then take the children in bubbles to their class and take details for the office. We ask in advance that if you are running late that you are patient with us whilst we ensure your child gets to class safely and with covid measures in place.

## **Thinking of Others**

During this Harvest time we have all been thinking about how thankful we are for what we have and showing compassion to those who may not have the same. Toby in Year 2 has astounded his peers with his generosity this week! For a while, Toby has been saving his pocket money up and has managed to raise an incredible £15. What is even more impressive is the selfless act he has chosen to complete by choosing to donate this money to the Rainbow Centre to help the homeless. He said he chose to do this because 'he does not like that people do not have what they need' and that 'everyone should be able to get the food they need'.

Well done Toby, we are very proud of you for modelling our Christian values.
