### **Principal Comments**

Summer is here! This time of year in the school is such a wonderful time. The grounds are in bloom, the trees look amazing and the children get a little more space to play and learn in. After a long commute into work, the colourful trees and welcoming site always bring a smile. Over the half term, we have had some further developments to our forest school provision. We have always had a space for a pond and after rain, if we were lucky, it was almost a puddle. Now it has been re-shaped, lined and ready for it to grow into a wonderful outside classroom. The landscapers will be installing a viewing and dipping platform and we hope by mid-term 6, it is a useable space for all children to use.

### **Time Flies:**

I can't believe we are almost at the end of term 5, leaving just one full term left in school. How the year is passing so quickly, I will never know. I am sure time passes more quickly in education. In no time at all, the children grow up and move on to secondary and beyond. Recently, we have had some ex pupils return for work experience and again, a little reminder of how quickly time passes. They were the children of Years 5 and 6 in my first year here. They looked so grown up, were extremely respectful and very helpful. We are also reminded that very soon, our current Year 6 pupils will be moving on too. This week they have their SAT tests. I am not sure I will ever understand the true value of the tests but they certainly bring a sense of occasion and a little stress for us all. I haven't seen the content of the test, but I'm pretty sure they won't be assessing the unique skills of the children or their resilience and determination to manage a lockdown, access and engage with home learning with all the distractions and challenges that brought, or a societal shift in socialisation and managing the news of a war. In many ways, our pupils have endured a lifetime of challenge in a very short space of time. So, this week, as they are sitting their tests, I will be beaming with pride that as a school we have ensured our children can confidently sit the tests and have reconnected with school and each other, despite the narrative they have lived. I know you will wish them all the very best of luck and send a few prayers (or answers) our way.

### **Keeping Safe:**

With a fully open school and no restrictions, I must share my thoughts on a recent shift. All through lockdown and with reduced site traffic, there was a notable tone of respectful regard for each other and a calm and careful flow of community members around the site. Recently, myself and other staff have been spoken to in quite abusive ways in response to asking for people to follow the rules we have to keep all safe. They have been fairly simple things like asking children to walk rather than ride bikes, asking parents to supervise their children after school to keep them safe and also speaking to those who want to park on the zig zag lines. It doesn't happen a lot, but once is enough and it is disappointing as we work so hard to ensure we have a wonderful and safe school for everyone to attend. This does also include staff! I would like to politely ask all members of the community to follow our simple rules by being safe, ready and respectful. Anyone using abusive language or persistently refuses to follow site safety rules will not be permitted on the school site. There have also been a few complaints from the residents of Philippa House, where children have been running through their gardens and people sitting on their garden walls and smoking. Another polite request from the school community to stop this. There is a bench at the end of the road should anyone need to sit and smoke.

So please, walk the bikes and scooters, leave the dog at home, keep your children supervised and calm, leave the site promptly after collection, don't swear or smoke (on the school site) and try and be mindful of all other community members when parking the car.

### Jubilee:

The Queen's Jubilee is approaching fast and will happen over the half term and because of this, we will not be putting on a huge party in school as these would have already happened. However, as a way of marking this occasion we will be holding a red, white and blue day here in school on 14<sup>th</sup> June. The curriculum will follow the theme of the Jubilee and we will sing the National Anthem together after the children have planted some trees and plants in our new pond area, dedicated to our Queen. We will also be putting a plaque by the pond as a way of both marking the Jubilee and the opening of another one our wonderful outside classrooms.

Our children were almost at the front and centre right behind the main stage where famous artists and world champion beat boxers and street dancers memorised the children and staff. We sang to a full arena of parents and family members from around the country for all 150 attending schools. I cannot wait for next year and hopefully more children to take.

Here is a brief update from Gary who drove some of your donations out to the Ukraine: "just wanted to say thank you to you and St. Mary's for your support in helping to make the humanitarian mission to Ukraine possible. I took medical equipment (surgical vacuum machines, anaesthesia equipment and cardio monitors), as well as medical supplies (PPE, medicines, dressings, bandages, slings, tourniquets, crutches, wheelchairs etc.) to a city called Rivne in Ukraine. There, some of the equipment was given to the local military hospital and a civilian hospital, who were both extremely grateful. It was an experience I will never forget. Thanks again!"

### **International Work**

At the end of last term, the Global Councillors had a wonderful time learning how to program the Beebots to travel to the different Continents of the world, with the older group challenged to locate and send their Beebots to specific partner school countries. They were having to program the Beebot to go forward and backward, as well as turning to the left and right. A fun and great way to reinforce their learning about the Continents, Oceans and Countries of the World.



Years 3 and 4 sent a reciprocal 'Culture Box' to our partner College Pilote in Sousse, Tunisia in return for the one we received from them in January. The items were linked to Folkestone, so we sent a Seagull (made of felt), some shells, a piece of chalk from the White Cliffs, along with some books about 'Waste' and 'Plastic' linked to SDG 13, Climate Action. Year 3 also sent recycled note books they had made. They enclosed their written punch lines, linked to SDG 3, Health and Wellbeing, as well as the Wellbeing person they created in French and English. Our Tunisian friends were delighted with all of these.



Ukraine is never far from the pupils' thoughts, we are still getting messages from the teacher at our partner school there, although her school is closed. She sent us all an Easter Message *May your Easter baskets be filled with joy, happiness and PEACE*! and was thrilled about the humanitarian van from Folkestone with items from St. Mary's that drove to Ukraine.



In the first few days of this term, we've been learning about 'Earth Day.' It started with a Scavenger Hunt in the school grounds (linked to SDG 15) where the children had to find, draw and label flora and fauna. They then collected a few leaves, flowers and some grass to make a tree, which wasn't as easy as they thought! Our partner schools in India, Moldova, Tunisia, Taiwan, Malaysia, Bangladesh and South Africa will be sending us photos of the work they've done and supporting SDG 13, Climate Action.
