

## **Principal Comments**

I can't say much for the local gritting service though as on the Friday of that week, we had lots of our parents and pupils sliding and skating into school. I'd like to thank you all for showing resilience at the snow we received and continued to push on. It seems the country was in carnage though.

### Attendance:

The weather has affected our attendance a little and has taken our school average below 95%. We are still on track to meet our end of year targets and be above 96% but we will have to all work hard together to send the children in. Amidst all of the snow, the attendance of Years 1 and 3 remained strong, they averaged 98%. Kenya class in Year 4 also reached an amazing 99%. Well done to all of our parents in those year groups and thank you. Please note that we will not be authorising any term time holidays and will strongly consider issuing penalty notices to families whose attendance falls below the expectation of regular attendance or takes holiday without permission.

#### Curriculum:

You will have seen from Facebook that we have been busy across the school. Highlights for us are definitely the visiting local author Maz Evans who spent the day with us inspiring the children to write and launching our new library. I hope you have all had a chance to come and see our new Library. Seeing parents and children exploring the world of books at the end of the day is amazing. Please do feel free to come and use the library after school with your child. There will be a librarian in there most evenings. There are books for everyone to read – even grown-ups!

Thank you to everyone who dressed up for world book day. I hope you saw that we made the papers (again) but this time we had four pages of coverage. The children all looked amazing and some of the costumes made at home were inspiring. At times it was like walking through Hogwarts and along with the snow and ubiquitous Ice Queens, Narnia was well represented too! It was lovely to see a few Wallies, Spiderman, Hulks and other costumes from well-known comics.

#### Pupil responsibility:

We have been working to promote higher engagement in school life from our older pupils. Currently, they are taking on responsibilities for helping in and around the school. It has been interesting to see how they respond to responsibility, especially as the novelty wears off! I know that they will benefit from this as they get ready to transfer to secondary school. The roles are bringing out some lovely pastoral characteristics in the children. They are being very kind and helpful with the younger children, very responsible in both of the halls and some are now leading games on the playground. You will have seen a few new faces around the school. This term, we have welcomed Mrs. Attwater, Miss Milton, Miss Skelton and Miss Bruce-Johnson to our team. They will be supporting across both Key Stages and are already settled in and making a big difference.

Miss Gardiner will be returning next week following her maternity leave. In typical Miss Gardiner style, she is highly motivated to get back to work and we are really pleased to have her back. She will be working three days a week so that she can be a great mum as well as a great Deputy Principal. In order to ensure the strength of the senior team is not affected by this reduced time, I have also appointed Mrs. O'Grady to the position of Deputy Principal. This means that both Miss Gardiner and Mrs. O'Grady will be Deputy Principals. Miss Gardiner will lead on Inclusion and Wellbeing and Mrs. O'Grady will lead on the Teaching and Learning.
