This is especially important between the transitions from lunch break and the dinner hall. There have been a few occasions where I have asked the children to eat without talking to ensure the expectations of eating in the hall are made clear. This does not mean that there is a policy of eating in silence. Lunch is a social time for children and we promote that but equally have a duty to ensure all children can enjoy their lunch. I know that you will be supportive with this but if you do have any further concerns, please come and speak with me directly. Rumours do have a habit of spreading quickly and can cause a lot of unnecessary worry.
