From September, we have been informed that the cost of a school meal is increasing from £2.05 per day to £2.20 per day (£11.00 per five day week). Cheques should be made payable to Caterlink. From September, all payments should be made on the Monday of each week for the week ahead. If payment is not received, Caterlink will chase this payment and it may well be that they will stop any further meals for your child until the outstanding amount is received. Caterlink money envelopes are available from the school office.

School Uniform

No trainers or boots are allowed and all children must have plimsolls for indoor PE and trainers for outside PE. Their PE kit must also be in line with school policy – this must be a white t-shirt and blue shorts. A tracksuit can be worn in the winter months. These must be kept in a PE bag in their locker. I have purchased new uniform for spares in the school should any child not come with the correct one. This is an important part of our school and I trust that you will support this as it forms part of the home school agreement and encourages a community feel.
