Principal Comments

What another amazing year at St. Mary's. I am not a big fan of tests but it is always nice to see the school's results rise year on year. Our children offer so much more to us than a set of numbers but, equally, we should still all be very proud of their results. We have had tremendous success.

Our children have made exceptional progress across the school. In Year R they have left above national figures again, despite starting from lower than the national average. Their writing is wonderful and shows the impact that our curriculum and resourcing of Early Years is having. They are getting the best start possible.

Our Year 2 pupils have also achieved our best results ever in the school. Over 80% of the pupils reached expected in all subjects and over a third of the year groups reached exceeding in Reading, Writing and Maths. They have built on their Early Years success and have shown the impact of the great teaching in Years 1 and 2. They will start Year 3 ready to excel further. Well done to them all, they are such a great year group.

Further to this, our wonderful Year 6 pupils have also made exceptional progress and many of them have reached expected and exceeding levels in their KS2 SATs. I am so proud of what they have achieved, their perseverance and their attitude to learning. During the Leavers' Service at Church, I sat with my eyes full of tears. The children were so proud of their achievements and I could sense equal pride beaming from the benches full of parents. Their singing was inspirational and their reflections equally so. They leave us this year and will flourish in their new schools as a result of great foundations set here. It will be a very sad day for us all. They have blossomed into young, caring citizens ready to shine bright and succeed.

All of this wonderful news comes from the sustained and dedicated service our staff show to the children and the support you as their family give them and the school. On top of great results, we have the best attendance scores we have had for many years -96%. This is significantly better and shows what a little bit of teamwork and motivation can achieve.

This past week has also been a busy week. It's been a pleasure to hear the pupils say that they love their new classes and the teachers echoing this. This week has been full of learning too with teachers getting their new classes ready and setting even higher aspirations.

Over the summer, please remember to encourage your children to read daily and practice their basic number skills with times tables. This will help them leap frog into their new year groups and continue to help build an Outstanding Primary School at the end of Warren Road.
