

REMEMBRANCE - MEMORIALS

Revelation 21:4

You will need images of a large war memorial eg Theipval, the Somme, your local war memorial, of someone on your local war memorial with details of their life, also a poppy

I wonder who is remembered on each of these memorials. I wonder why these are important to people today. Focus down from the large numbers to the local numbers to the single person that you have found out about. You could ask a child to stand up to represent that one person and then ask others around them to stand up to represent that person's family, their school friends, their work colleagues, neighbours, Army friends etc. This might be almost all of those gathered. In remembering this one person, we remember how many people would have been affected by their death in the war in which they fought. If you then think of multiplying the numbers back up to the local war memorial and then the French memorials — I wonder how many people were affected by the Two World Wars and are still being affected by wars today.

Reflect: each name is a life and each life lost is a heavy loss for their community. That is why we keep remembering as a community today with thanksgiving for those who served and for those who lost people they loved.

Dear God, we pray for everyone affected by wars today and by wars of the past. Help us to remember and to work for peace – at home, at school and always. AMEN

ANTI-BULLYING WEEK – Odd Socks Day UNITED AND UNIQUE

This week is Anti-Bullying week. Children and teachers all over the UK will be wearing odd socks today. Why?

God has created us to be united, to work together as a team, to look after one another and build one another up.

In the Bible it talks about us being the body of Christ. We are all parts of the same body and we all have different functions. But we have to work together to make the body work. It would be no good if we were all hands, or all toes! (perhaps use a Mr Potato Head with all the parts in the wrong places, or too many ears etc to illustrate this). We should celebrate each others' strengths and be united in them. Mr Potato Head needs all his parts – they are all important.

Psalm 139 verse 14: "I am fearfully and wonderfully made"

INCREDIBLE ME! ... One of the greatest difficulties for kids (as well as adults) in this world we live in is our identity. The world wants to mould and conform us. When we don't feel like we fit the "norm", we can feel left out, invaluable, unloved and down right "weird"!

We all would love to see ourselves as a "super hero"! Well, the real Super Man was "just" Clark Kent; the real Spider Man was "just" Peter Parker, etc. - ordinary people with supernatural gifts/abilities. God uses ordinary, unexpected people to do extraordinary spectacular feats! 
•In pairs try to stack as many Cheerios onto an uncooked piece of spaghetti as you can – only use one hand each!

Advent: HOPE and PEACE

Read John 14:27

This week we are thinking about Advent. There are four symbols of advent – Hope, Peace, Love and Joy.

Today we are thinking about HOPE and PEACE. HOPE: Talk about the children's hopes. Can they think about bigger hopes – what might be the hope for our school? (A community of happy successful children?) What might the hope be for the world (an end to poverty?)

PEACE: Think back to the verse we read at the beginning. I wonder why peace was so important to Jesus and why he wanted to leave peace with his disciples? I wonder why we see situations in school, in our community and around the world where peace is lacking? I wonder why peace is not a natural part of the way in which people live and act? I wonder if you have any ideas about how this could be changed?



Advent: LOVE and JOY

Luke 2:10-11

JOY: Although it is a while to go to Christmas, the message of the angels is one of the most joyful in the Bible (see verses above) and can be used to express the Christian joy at any time of the year. I wonder what brings you joy? I wonder how you seek to bring joy to others?

LOVE: I wonder if you have shown that you love someone this week? I wonder if you know anyone who is lonely or unhappy who especially needs your love just now? I wonder what Jesus meant by his words in today's Bible verse? Happy times of celebration can be a lonely time for many people, and a time when some people can feel stressed and unloved as they see others being happy and being loved.

Advent: Jesse Tree

We will be using the idea of the genealogy (ancestry) of Jesus to lead up to Christmas and to develop understanding about how Christmas and the concept of Incarnation fit into the Big Story of the Bible. This can also be related to the Big Frieze from Understanding Christianity to make appropriate links with what pupils already know (as long as this does not become too complicated!)

https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=5qKuDlBvKf4 — this is an explanation of the Jesse tree for teachers. Set up a way of adding to a Jesse tree in school/your classroom each day — perhaps your worship leader can help with this?

Explain how we are going to reveal a different part of the Big Story of the Bible each day during Advent, to help you to understand how Christmas 'fits in'. To help you to journey through Advent to Christmas, we will reveal the different characters each day like an Advent calendar. Today we are going to look at Picture 1 and 2.

TODAY: Picture 1: Creation

When God created the world it was perfect – I wonder what that would have been like? Allow the children share experiences of awe and wonder at creation – eg a love of snow, rainbows, waves...

Thank you, Creator God, for making our wonderful world. Thank you for creating humans, thank you that we are all different, with different gifts and skills. Help us to remember that your promises are true and that you are with us every day. Amen.

Picture 2: Adam and Eve (The Fall)

Genesis 2:4-3:24

This is the story of the fall, when Adam and Eve disobeyed God and had to leave the garden. It is a sad story and it's ok to reflect that in our worship today – God created our emotions.

Talk about how we feel when we do something we know is wrong. How do our teachers/parents feel when we disobey them? Adam and Eve had to follow the consequence for their action. Are there always consequences to our actions?

Ask the children to reflect on this and the importance of saying sorry. Children could privately write a sorry prayer that can be destroyed in some way afterwards.

Classes can add the first 2 pictures to their class Jesse Tree.



Picture 3: Noah - God's Promise

What do the children already know about the story of Noah?

Talk about the message of the story. What does the story tell us about God?

Have you ever made a promise before? What does it mean to make a promise?

Talk about some of the promises that God makes in the Bible. They show that he is fully trustworthy and doesn't break his promise.

Day 4: Abraham - God's Promise

Watch this video of the story of Abraham https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=rDz-7OX4C9k

What is meant by the word 'promise': a clear intention of something that will happen. Give examples, e.g. the Brownie Guide Law, 'I promise that I will do my best, to love my God, to serve my queen and my country, to help other people and to keep the Brownie Guide Law.' This is said by someone who wants to be enrolled or join the Brownies.

Show the children a £10 or £20 note and read the words on the front: 'I promise to pay the bearer on demand the sum of £10/£20.' Each note is signed by the Bank of England. That promise means that you can spend that money.

Ask for other examples of promises from the children.

Ask them how they feel when promises are broken, either by themselves, or by others: disappointed, let down, angry, upset?

Think about the keeping of promises:

how hard it is sometimes to keep them,

and how disappointed or upset we can get if they are not kept. Have you ever said 'I promise', and not really meant it? How can you keep your promises in future?

Add the new symbol to the Jesse Tree.

Pray a prayer of THANKS – Thanking God that we are part of his bog family and his promise to bless us.

Picture 5: Joseph

Recap the Big story of the Bible so far. We are still in the old testament today, still in the first book of the bible - Genesis - a lot happens in Genesis! Today's story is about Joseph.

Read the story of Joseph in the Jesus Storybook Bible: the Forgiving Prince page 76.

Joseph's life was full of ups and downs, like a game of Snakes And Ladders, but it wasn't chance, or a roll of the dice, that decided what happened to Joseph. It was no accident that he ended up becoming Prime Minister of Egypt. It was God who had made things turn out this way.

Christians believe that God is in control of everything that happens to us. That doesn't mean that bad things don't happen. He doesn't always take the bad things away or stop them from happening and that can be hard to understand. However, when bad things happen there are two important lessons that we can learn from the story of Joseph.

- 1. In everything that happens, God is with us. In the Bible, every time something bad happens to Joseph the narrator says, 'But God was with Joseph.' God was with Joseph in the tough times as well as in the good times. The bad times did not mean that God had forgotten about him or didn't care about him anymore. Instead, God had been there with him, helping him to be brave and strong and to get through.
- 2. In everything that happens God is at work for good. In the story of Joseph, He even took the bad things that people did and made them turn out for good in the end. This reminds us of a wonderful promise that God has given to all those who love Him

Reflection / Prayer: Ask the children to think of a 'down' time in their lives - e.g. when they were treated unfairly, or when things didn't work out the way they had hoped. How did they react?

Conclude with a prayer asking God to help the children keep on trusting Him and doing what is right - even when things seem unfair or don't work out the way they had hoped. Add the next picture to the Jesse tree.



Picture 6: Moses

About 300 years have gone by since the story of Joseph. The Israelite people are a really large group now (Just as God promised to Abraham all those years ago) but they now need to escape from Egypt because they are being treated as slaves by the Pharaoh of Egypt. They remembered God's promise to them that would take them to the Promised Land. Moses was their Leader at this time.

God is with us and will help us. How did God help Moses and the Israelites.

Ask your class what they have need for and what they want God to help them with and pray for these things.

I wonder why King David is the next person we are thinking about? King David was the great grandson of Ruth. He became king after Saul, who was the first king of Israel. Saul had not obeyed God and so Samuel was sent to find the next king of Israel to replace Saul - this was David.

I wonder what made him a good king? I wonder if you know where David lived and why this might be significant in the Big Story of the Bible?

As soon as Samuel saw David, he knew that he was God's choice.

What kind of person do you think would make a good leader? What kind of person do you think would make a good friend? Are you a good friend to other people?

Samuel had to learn that what people look like on the outside doesn't really show what they are like on the inside. We should always get to know someone first before we decide what they are

Picture 8: Isaiah

Read "No more Tears" from the Jesus Storybook Bible.

I wonder what a prophet is? I wonder what a prophecy is? I wonder why this passage is read at Christmas services? Isaiah was an important prophet in the Big Story of the Bible. He looked forward to how the world might look in the future he looked forward to the Kingdom of God and he used pictures to talk about what that Kingdom might look like and talked about the one who would bring that Kingdom - Jesus!


Use the resource at the end of this document to role-play an interview for Isaiah (children asking a question each from the sheet or between adults etc depending on age group) At the end, read the letter from the Jesus Storybook bible again and ask the children to listen out for what it tells them about Jesus.

Isaiah lived about 700 years before Jesus, but in his book in the Bible we read about Jesus all the time. Isaiah knew because God told it to him. God wanted his people to know about his rescue plan and his Rescuer (Jesus) and so Isaiah told it to the people.

Picture 9: Daniel

Today we are learning about Daniel. Daniel had a good habit. What habits do we have? Good or bad? Find out what Daniel's was in this video.

Daniel had the courage to keep his good habit going, even if when it was difficult.

Play a game of 'odd one out'.

Ask the children if they have ever felt like an odd one out, as if there was nobody else like them.

Here are some situations that they might be facing, I wonder if there is anyone here today who knows how that feels.

- Their parents won't allow them the latest computer game, which all their friends are talking about.
- They want to work hard at school, but their friends prefer mucking about.
- They prefer reading to football.
- They believe in God and go to church with their family, but their friends don't.
- Perhaps, when they are older, they will find that their friends want to try smoking, but they know that it is harmful.

There can be many reasons for us to feel that we are standing alone, that we are an odd one out. It takes courage to be different, to take a stand, to say 'No'.

When Daniel decided to continue praying to his God, he didn't know what the outcome of his decision would be. He certainly did not fancy his chances with lions, but he also knew that he couldn't agree with the decree. It was a very tough decision to stand alone, to be the odd one out.

Of course, Daniel was not alone. He had a God who had promised never to leave him or to forsake him. He knew that it was right to continue to trust in his God.

Picture 11: Jesus

Today's story is VERY special. It's the first story from the New Testament. All the stories we've heard so far lead up to this amazing event – the birth of Jesus!

Using a flipchart, put a line down the middle of the page. Ask a child to draw answers on one side of the line to start with.

Where are kings born/live? (Palaces, castles)

What does a king's bed look like? (big, comfortable, covered in jewels)

What sort of colours might be used to decorate a palace?

Jesus is a king, but he wasn't born in a place like that. Now draw your answers on the other side of the line

Where was King Jesus born? (draw stable with animals)

What did Jesus' bed look like (small, straw, dirty)

What sort of colours would the stable be?

Look at how different your two pictures are!

What does this tell us about the kind of King that Jesus is? Thank God that he came to live with us and be our rescuer and friend.

The children can add the next picture to their tree.



Picture 12: Jesus – the GOOD NEWS and the angels and shepherds.

Read the story form the Jesus Bible Storybook pages 184-191 Today's story is all about GOOD NEWS! Share some good news stories. The star that God put in the sky in the story we have just read was like a spotlight, shining on Jesus, announcing his birth. God also did something else to announce this good news – he sent a huge choir of angels to light up the night sky and tell the shepherds there that Jesus had been born.

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NO.	QUESTION FOR INDEX CARD	ISAIAH'S ANSWER
1	What do you do?	Thank you for asking; I am a prophet.
2	What does a prophet do?	The biggest part of my job is to listen to God and tell the people what God said.
3	Do you like being a prophet?	It's hard work and can be very sad when people don't believe me. That happens a lot.
4	Why don't people believe you?	Sometimes people don't want to hear what God has to say. Also because some of the things are about the future, people find it hard to believe them.
5	Can you tell the future?	No. No. No. But God knows the future and sometimes he tells it to me so I can tell it to the people.
6	What did God tell you about the future?	I KNEW you were going to ask me that! No, just kidding. One of the really exciting things God told me about was his rescue plan, about how he will rescue his people and fix everything that is broken in the world.
7	Why do we need a rescue plan?	People are always running away from God. People sin all the time. But God's rescue plan will bring his people back to him and make everything sad come untrue.
8	What does it mean for everything sad to come untrue?	It means there will be no more sadness. There will be no more pain or tears or fear or death. Everything will be perfect again, like it was in the beginning when God created the world.
9	How will that happen?	The rescue plan is all about someone called a Rescuer and a King and a Servant and a Light and a Lamb and a Shepherd and so many other names. This Rescuer King Servant Light Lamb Shepherd (that was hard to say!) will come to earth and do many amazing things, but then he wil suffer and die.
10	Why will he die?	He will die instead of God's people. He will take the punishment for their sin by dying in their place. But he won't stay dead; God will make him alive again. That is how the Rescuer King Servant Light Lamb Shepherd will rescue his people.
11	Who is this Rescuer King Servant Light Lamb Shepherd?	THAT is a great question. But it is a question I think you should answer. Let me read to you from my letter, but this time listen carefully for all the names of this person.
